Regular inspection for corrosion, deformation, or coating damage is essential to maintain long-term fire safety. **Heat Dissipation and Cable Protection:** Use perforated or wire mesh trays to allow airflow and prevent heat accumulation. Maintain adequate spacing between cables to reduce the risk of overheating, short circuits, or electromagnetic interference (EMI), . Horizontal spacing between power and signal trays should generally be at least 0.5 meters, though shielding can reduce this distance . **Aesthetics and Practicality:** In a front room, visual impact may be a concern. Options include using enclosed or channel trays that blend with the ceiling or wall, or routing trays along less visible areas such as corners or behind trim . For temporary or low-profile installations, flat or adhesive-backed cables can be used to minimize visual disruption .

Installation Tips

- o Ensure trays are properly supported with rods or brackets to prevent sagging and maintain structural integrity .
- o Avoid running trays directly under doors or high-traffic areas unless protected by cable ramps or raceways .
- o Plan the route to allow future maintenance and expansion, keeping cables tidy and accessible .
