For conduit drop-outs at tray ends, use a grounding bushing with a bonding wire bolted to the tray to prevent electrical hazards .

Cable Organization and Labeling

Organize cables at tray ends to prevent tangling and overheating. Maintain zoning and tiered arrangements if multiple cable types are present, keeping power, signal, and control cables separated . Clearly label each cable at the tray end, including type, size, installation date, and purpose, to facilitate maintenance and troubleshooting . Ensure cables are not tightly packed to allow airflow and prevent heat buildup .

Pulling and Bending Considerations

When routing cables to the tray end, avoid sharp bends and respect the manufacturer's minimum bending radius. Use pulling wheels or rollers to guide cables smoothly into the tray end, and avoid reverse bending over reel flanges during installation . This prevents internal damage and maintains cable integrity.
